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Foreword

First of all, welcome to all the new university freshmen joining National Chengchi University (NCCU)! This handbook is primarily for first-year students entering the NCCU College of Law after the 110th academic year, and it aims to help freshmen plan their legal studies.

The NCCU College of Law was established in 1946, originally formed from over ten departments, including Political Science, Diplomacy, Economics, Sociology, Finance and Taxation, and Law. Since the 1993 academic year, the Department of Law became an independent college, affirming the importance of law in social sciences research. This was also a pioneering move among national universities at the time.

Currently, the College of Law comprises the Department of Law (which includes undergraduate, master's, and doctoral programs), the Master's Program for Working Professionals, and the Graduate Institute of Interdisciplinary Legal Studies. The Master's Program in Law is divided into six tracks based on different admission exam subjects: Public Law, Civil Law, Criminal Law, Financial and Economic Law, Labor and Social Law, and Fundamental Legal Studies. Each of these tracks has its own research center, along with two additional centers, the Research Center for Chinese Mainland Legal Studies and the Center for Interdisciplinary Legal Studies, making a total of eight research centers. The Master's Program for Working Professionals admits both law and non-law graduates, while the Graduate Institute of Interdisciplinary Legal Studies focuses on integrating legal expertise with specialized professional fields for non-law graduates.

The College of Law has academic exchanges with universities in Germany, the United States, and East Asian countries, including Japan, South Korea, Singapore, and Mainland China. Currently, we have established academic exchange agreements with many university law schools, aiming to cultivate legal professionals with an international perspective.

At NCCU, we aim to nurture legal professionals not only with theoretical knowledge and practical skills but also with expertise that can be applied in public service, academia, the corporate sector, and non-profit organizations. In the era of globalization, legal professionals must not only master legal knowledge but also possess strong foreign language skills to engage with the international community and critically evaluate foreign legal systems and cultures. We hope our law graduates will not only uphold a sense of justice but also possess the ability to apply their legal knowledge in society under the framework of legal ethics, ultimately contributing to the realization of human rights protection.

While studying law at NCCU, students can also enjoy a vibrant and diverse campus life through various student organizations. We hope that you have a colorful and memorable university experience. II. COURSE OVERVIEW

1.Course Summary

The graduation credit requirement for this department is 128 credits. The credits are divided into blocks as follows:

- **Core Courses:** 49-51 credits must be completed.
- **General Education Courses (e.g., Chinese, English, other general education subjects):** 28 credits must be completed.
- **Elective Courses:** 45-47 credits must be completed.
- **Physical Education:** 4 credits must be completed.

As shown in the above image, the university's general education courses are divided into "Basic Language Courses," "General Education Courses," and "College General Education." The Basic Language General Education Courses are categorized into Chinese Language and Foreign Languages. The General Education Courses are further divided into Humanities, Social Sciences, Natural Sciences, and Information. Students must complete a total of 28 credits in general education courses to be eligible for graduation.

1. Language Courses

(1) Chinese Acquisition

Students in their first year are required to complete three credits of Chinese language courses within the designated time frame of their respective department, such as Selected Classical Poetry, Selected Classical Novels, or Selected Modern Essays, as a graduation requirement.

(2) Foreign Language General Education :

(a) **University Basic English Courses:** These courses are part of the foundational general education program, divided into two semesters, with each semester offering three credits, totaling six credits.

2. General education courses are divided into four categories: Humanities, Social Sciences, Natural Sciences, and Information Science. Additionally, freshmen taking interdisciplinary general education courses within "General Education" can choose which category the credits will apply to.

3. College General Education

College General Education includes Freshman Orientation and Practical Action courses.

(二) Core Courses

The design of the core subjects includes foundational courses in Public Law, Civil Law, Criminal Law, Financial and Economic Law, Fundamental Legal Studies, Labor Law, and Social Law.

Students must complete at least 49-51 credits in core subjects to meet graduation requirements.

Additionally, students should be aware of course prerequisites. Students who have not completed General Principles of Civil Law are not permitted to enroll in the General Principles of Obligations, Property Law, or Family Law. Those who have not completed Criminal Law I cannot take Criminal Law II, and those who have not completed Administrative Law I cannot take Administrative Law II. However, exceptions can be made with the consent of the course instructor. In such cases, students must fill out the "Permission Form for Restricted Courses" and submit it to the undergraduate course assistant by the course add/drop deadline for manual enrollment. (三) Elective Courses

Elective courses include both internal and external electives, allowing students to choose courses based on their personal interests and future professional plans. Students are free to select electives from within their department or from other departments within the university.

Not choosing an elective program within the department will not affect graduation. Students only need to complete the required courses and credits for the elective programs they choose and submit the application form before the deadline announced by the college for the undergraduate program to obtain the program completion certificate.

The availability of elective programs depends on the teachers scheduled for the academic year, and these will usually be announced before course registration during winter and summer vacations. 2. Double Majors and Minors

Starting from their second year, undergraduate students at our university may apply to pursue a double major or minor in another department. The approval criteria for double majors and minors vary by department. Students should first review the standards for double majors and minors for that academic year and then submit their application to the respective departments according to the schedule announced by the university.

To obtain a certificate for a double major or minor, students must complete the required credits as stipulated by the respective departments. Utilizing the double major and minor system can help students with career planning and create a second area of expertise during their university years, which is a valuable strategy.

III. Course Selection Guide

1. Course Schedule and Syllabus The course schedule and syllabus are published annually by the Office of Academic Affairs. Please refer to their website for the most current information.

2. Course Registration Method All course registration is done online. The process includes initial selection in two stages, add/drop period, course add and drop, and handling of registration issues not attributable to the student. Please be mindful of the course registration timeline as announced in the school calendar; late submissions will not be accepted.

3. Course Registration Timeline The initial selection for the fall semester typically begins at the end of August, while the initial selection for the spring semester usually starts in mid-January. The add/drop period takes place after the start of the semester. Specific dates will be announced by the Office of Academic Affairs.

4. Initial Selection and Add/Drop During the initial selection phase, students may register for up to 30 courses and set their priority for course allocation. In the add/drop phase, students can register for up to 50 courses (including courses already selected, on the waitlist, and newly registered courses). The credit limit for the initial selection is capped at the student's maximum credit limit (31 credits for students with a double major, 28 credits for students with a minor, and 25 credits for those without additional majors). Senior students who need to exceed the credit limit for required physical education courses should apply online within the specified period. For questions, please contact the Physical Education Office. Since the 99th academic year, the requirement to select at least one military training course has been abolished. For related inquiries, please contact the Military Training Office.

Students who wish to drop courses that they have already been accepted into can do so in subsequent phases of the registration process. For instance, during the first phase of the initial selection, students can drop courses related to "allocation," "automatic assignment," and "transfer" within each department. In the second phase, students may drop courses from the first phase and newly selected courses, and so forth. For courses where withdrawal is not allowed, students should contact the course offering unit for assistance during the registration period.

5. Course Add/Drop After the add/drop period, students who have courses on the waitlist and whose selected courses do not overlap with their desired courses can print an "Add Slip" from the add/drop system. This slip, after being signed by the instructor, should be submitted to the "Course Offering Unit" for processing. For dropping courses, students should print a "Drop Slip" from the system, have it signed by the instructor, and submit it to the "Office of Academic Affairs Registration Section." The maximum number of courses that can be added is 5.

If the credits of selected courses reach the maximum credit limit for the semester during the course add/drop system configuration, further course additions cannot be processed through the system.

6. Handling Non-Student Fault Course Registration Issues For issues not attributable to the student, follow the course registration regulations and handle them with the course registration report form.

7. Course Withdrawal Students may withdraw from courses that are difficult or of no interest with the instructor's consent, but only one course per semester. For more detailed information on course registration, please refer to the Office of Academic Affairs website.

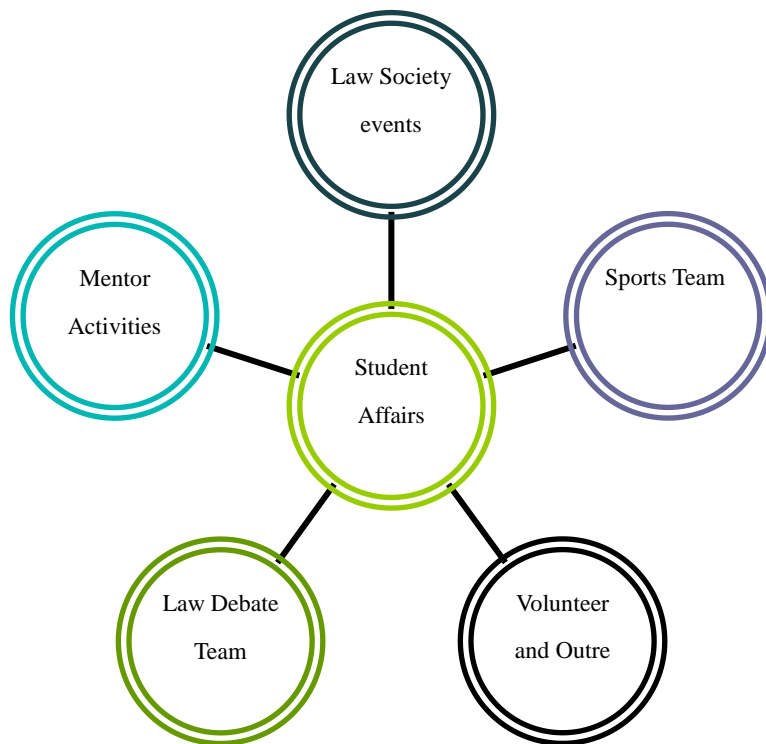
